

Official Language, Social Weapon

Tucano is a language spoken by about 4,600 people in the Amazon, mostly in the northwest corner of Brazil, called the Dog's Head because of the shape of the border there.

Tucano is one of the five official languages of the municipality of São Gabriel de Cachoeira, alongside Portuguese and three other Indigenous languages: Nheengatu, Baniwa, and Yanomamo. Tucano is an isolate, meaning that it is not related to any other known language. The following problem plays on the unusual way suffixes work in Tucano.

Here are some words in Tucano and their translations in English. (Tones have been omitted to make the problem easier to solve.)
